
"I'll never make it to school on time if I do that," Calvin <u>remonstrated</u> (8), cramming a banana into his lunch box with an extremely hard shove. (9)

The function of the underlined phrase 4 in the story is to portray to the reader just how chaotic Calivin appears and is acting. He "churned in a hurricane of activity" because he was trying to hurry.

The use of "Calvin churned in a hurricane of activity" uses rhetoric and figurative language to help the reader understand the extent of chaos caused by Calvin's behavior. By comparing Calvin and the damage he brings to that of a *hurricane*, the reader can visualize and comprehend how hectic the situation truly is. There is also clear use of diction by using "churned" as opposed to other verbs to show the nature of the situation. These elements combine to help the reader understand and visualize the situation clearly.
