

Let's Get to Know One Another

by Danielle Poorman

- 1 Have you ever seen a horse at a fair, on a farm, or on a city street? You may have thought how beautiful that creature was. Maybe you wanted to reach out and pet the horse, but you were scared. Horses are enormous, strong animals.
- 2 Yes, horses can be frightening at times. But did you know that horses may be afraid of you, too? Imagine that you meet someone you don't know. You are probably uncertain of what the person is going to think, say, or do. Horses have the same problem: They don't know what those strange, two-legged creatures are going to think, say, or do! You both have to overcome your fears and gain one another's trust.
- When you approach a horse, walk slowly. This will let the horse know that you do not present any danger. Stick out your hand flat toward its nose. The horse will bend its head down and sniff your hand. (Horses have an excellent sense of smell, and that is what helps them sense danger.) Once the horse realizes it can trust you, you can pet it. Do this slowly and calmly. Any quick movements may frighten the horse.





Take Care You should always:

1. ask a horse's owner before you
approach it, and
2. have an adult present.

- 4 Much like people, horses fear the unknown. Watch a horse carefully and you will see it gives certain signals. If its tail twitches quickly back and forth, it means that it is nervous. If a horse is angry or senses danger, its ears will lie flat. The ears are the most sensitive part of a horse's body, and a horse feels an instinct to protect them.
- 5 Remember that you want to form a relationship with the horse just as you would with a friend. Talking to it is an excellent way to start. You may think that is very strange, since horses obviously do not speak. But if you speak to the horse in a kind tone, it will respond by nuzzling. That lets you know that the horse is comfortable with you.
- Another way to make friends with a horse is to spend time taking care of it. If you are lucky enough to be able to care for a horse, you can gain its trust. As you give it food and water, and brush and pet it every day, you and the horse get to know one another. Think about how you care for your pets at home. You feed them, play with them, and talk to them. It is the same with a horse.



7 So the next time you meet a horse, remember that you are new to the horse also. You could be the special person who helps the horse learn not to be afraid.
